→ Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John

All Glory to you, O Lord.

Mary and Martha sent this message to Jesus, 'Lord, the man you love is ill.' On receiving the message, Jesus said, 'This sickness will end not in death but in God's glory, and through it the Son of God will be glorified.'

Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, yet when he heard that Lazarus was ill he stayed where he was for two more days before saying to the disciples, 'Let us go to Judaea.'

On arriving, Jesus found that Lazarus had been in the tomb for four days already. When Martha heard that Jesus had come she went to meet him. Mary remained sitting in the house. Martha said to Jesus, 'If you had been here, my brother would not have died, but I know that, even now, whatever you ask of God, he will grant you.' 'Your brother' said Jesus to her 'will rise again.' Martha said, 'I know he will rise again at the resurrection on the last day.' Jesus said:

'I am the resurrection and the life.

If anyone believes in me, even though he dies he will live,

and whoever lives and believes in me will never die.

Do you believe this?'

'Yes, Lord,' she said 'I believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, the one who was to come into this world.'

'Take the stone away.' Martha said to him, 'Lord, by now he will smell; this is the fourth day.' Jesus replied, 'Have I not told you that if you believe you will see the glory of God?' So they took away the stone. Then Jesus lifted up his eyes and said:

'Father, I thank you for hearing my prayer.

I knew indeed that you always hear me,

but I speak for the sake of all these who stand round me,

so that they may believe it was you who sent me.'

If the Angelus is to be sung, the Priest will move to stand before the statue of Our Lady of Walsingham. The words and music are to be found on page 13. This ancient prayer, dating to at least the 12th Century, recalls the Annunciation to Mary (when the Angel Gabriel appeared to her) and the Incarnation of her blessed Son. The Priest returns to the altar as the final hymn is sung. He and the servers reverence the altar and depart.

Take up thy cross, the Saviour said, If thou wouldst my disciple be; Deny thyself, the world forsake, And humbly follow after me.


Take up thy cross; let not its weight

And brace thy heart, and nerve thine arm.


Take up thy cross, nor heed the shame, Nor let thy foolish pride rebel; The Lord for thee the Cross endured, To save thy soul from death and hell.

Notices for the Week


- 1. Next Sunday is Palm Sunday. The 1000 Mass will begin in the hall, with the blessing of palms. We will then set-off on the Palm Procession as we remember the Triumphal Entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. Be sure to arrive in good time.
- 2. On Maundy Thursday, 6 April, immediately following the Mass of the Lord's Supper, will be the Watch of the Passion, until midnight. During this time, we recall the Lord's injunction to his disciples to 'watch and pray' with him in his agony in the Garden of Gethsemane. The Watch must be unbroken, so there is a tick list of time-slots at the back of church. There should be a minimum of two watchers present throughout. Please make sure the list is completed.
- 3. Stations of the Cross this week will be on Friday evening at 1800. This will be the last time this devotion will be offered this Lent. (Takes about 40 mins.)
- 4. The Sacrament of Reconciliation (Confession) will be available on Saturday morning from 0815-0845. Confessions will be heard at other times, by appointment.
- 5. Mass this Saturday will be at 0900. Please note the change of time.

Volunteers Needed

- On Saturday, a mighty work-party will be tidying-up the gardens and paths and sorting-out the Memorial Garden. Work will begin at 0945. If you've not volunteered yet, there's still time! Please help us with this.
- On Tuesday, 4 April, we'll be cleaning all the silver and brass in preparation for Easter. So if polishing's your thing, come along between 0930 and 1200. Sign-up today!
- On Holy Saturday, 8 April, we'll be making sure everything is sparkling for Easter and there will be lots to do as we put everything back after the simplicity of Good Friday. Morning Prayer will be said at 0900 and we'll start work after that. many hands make light work!

Lenten Veiling

From today until the Easter Vigil, all the crosses and statues in the church will be veiled in purple. Only the Stations of the Cross will remain unveiled. This is an ancient tradition of the Church, the first reference to which may be found in the 7th Century, though it did not become commonplace until around the 11th Century. For many hundreds of years, crosses and statues were veiled *throughout* Lent, but in the 17th Century, the practice became restricted to the last 2 weeks of Lent. As our focus turns ever more intently to the humiliation and suffering of Jesus on the cross, so the veiling serves to remind us that so great was his suffering that his divinity was almost eclipsed; likewise, even his humanity was obscured, so disfigured was his body by the scourging and wounds he received. Thus, in covering the cross (and other items) with a veil, so we 'hide' our Saviour and enter more deeply into his suffering.
